





## OUTREACH MINISTRY

March was a busy month for the Outreach Ministry Committee. We've just completed our Minnesota Food Share Campaign. We'd like to thank the Sunday School children, teachers, and Becky Crain for helping us on Pack-the-Pews Sunday. We collected 147 pounds of food and \$837.62 to be delivered to the Salvation Army! Thank you, also, to our church friends, for supporting this very worthy cause- and for your continued support of the Youth Foyer.

We were blessed with the opportunity to help out a school in need through a Healthy Church Initiative school grant. The name of the school is the East Range Academy of Technology and Science (ERATS) on Siegel Blvd. near Eveleth. Those of us who visited ERATS were impressed and touched by the dedication of the staff and the stories we heard. Besides their regular day program for students in 9th-12th grades, they offer afternoon classes for students with day jobs, babies, and other issues; and PLS- a separate school for students who are very credit deficient and need extra help to get back on track for graduation. All students are offered breakfast and lunch each day, and they participate in community service on Fridays. ERATS has a 5K walk/run every May to raise funds for their school. They are celebrating their 10th anniversary this year!

**One other note:** ERATS is looking for school board members. You do not need to be elected. Anyone interested can contact the school administration for more information.

Our next Outreach Ministry Committee meeting is on Thursday, April 20th at 1:00 pm. All are welcome!

We, on the committee would like to lift up Jeanne Cornell, who has been a real advocate for missions at our church. We will miss her greatly and wish her well in her new home.

## **PORCH: Community Experiences**

Where does community happen? When can community be experienced or felt? How do you know? Creating community is a complex and even confusing event. Over the years, the communities I have been a part of, gave me experiences of acceptance in many different, sometimes vastly different, ways. The goal of PORCH and its activities is to repeat the feelings of togetherness and acceptance that I and many of our congregation members felt in their communities. This may seem like a simple statement, but in reality it is easier said than done.

To begin this new ministry, we (the many leaders, volunteers, congregation, and staff) focused on making space, space where our neighbors could feel welcomed and included. While this space can be considered the physical aspects, such as the tables and chairs in the fellowship hall and classrooms, it is also the emotional aspects, such as a gentle smile, a friendly conversation, or the sharing of meaningful and personal stories, etc. We believe that the space is considered an important part of PORCH, because it is within a positive and affirming space that we can feel true community. But, how do we know when others experience or feel community?

While I cannot speak for the experiences of others, I can write about my own observations at PORCH. I've seen congregation members stepping out of their comfort zones to invite unfamiliar people and their families to join us for dinner, such as the tile contractor and his two daughters. I have heard people share unhappy, even painful, experiences during their small groups and found reassurance that their feelings are important to the rest of the group. I have even seen an entire group of diners leave their individual rooms (due to our flooring renovations) to form a circle and sing "Happy Birthday" to a very smiley and excited four-year-old girl, Cayleigh. If this isn't community, I'm not sure what is.

## APPORTIONMENTS

**What are apportionments?** The main way we support the ministries of the church is through our apportioned funds, a method of giving that proportionally allocates the global and Minnesota church budgets to local congregations. Each year, every local church is assigned “a portion meant for others.” The amount of money each congregation is asked to pay is determined by a formula that, in Minnesota, is based 15 percent on each congregation’s number of members and 85 percent on each congregation’s expenditures.

Together, through our connected congregations, we accomplish what no single church, district, or annual conference ever could hope to do alone. In this way, each individual, each family and each congregation contributes to the church’s work. We combine our prayers, presence, gifts, and service to make a significant difference in the lives of God’s people.

Did you know that you made it possible last year for two new churches to launch, one church to expand to a second location, 20 churches to begin intensive revitalization processes and hundreds to learn new approaches at breakthrough workshop? These are just a few of the things made possible through churches’ apportioned giving – which enable life-changing mission and ministry in Minnesota and across the globe.
